A pair of Chinese cloisonné enamelled figures of elephants, probably Jiaqing period, each caparisoned beast modelled standing four-square with head lowered and turned to the side, the body in white with gilt detailing, decorated with colourful trappings and draped in a saddle cloth, brightly enamelled with a hanging chime and vapours above crashing waves on a turquoise ground, supporting a double-gourd shaped vase with ribbon handles, height 31cm, each raised on a carved hardwood stand, total height 40cm. Note: the elephant in China is one of the seven Buddhist sacred treasures and symbolizes peace. The combination of an elephant supporting a vase on its back is a reference to peaceful times (taiping youxiang), making pairs of elephants carrying vases an important part of the Imperial throne regalia. A similar pair of figures is illustrated by H. Brinker & A. Lutz in 'Chinese Cloisonné: The Pierre Uldry Collection', number 332, and a very similar single figure was sold by Bonhams, Hong Kong, 3rd November 2015, Lot 51.

Condition Report

4020. Overall both in very good condition with good vibrant colours.

Elephant on left side of image - small bruise to left side shoulder which has had some filling, approx 3 by 2cm. Otherwise no other significant damage or repairs. Typical light surface wear and scratches. Elephant on right side of image - no significant damage or repairs. Typical light stress crazing to lower part of front apron where slightly pushed back. Right ear a little loose. Typical light surface wear and scratches. Stands - both in good condition with typical surface wear.

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
