### LOT 712

An Edwardian gold, emerald and diamond ring, circa 1910, mounted with three rectangular step cut emeralds alternating with two cushion cut diamonds, with four pairs of rose cut diamond points at intervals, the mount decorated with scroll pierced sides, ring size approx L1/2, with a case to hold six rings.

Estimate: £400 - £600

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### Condition Report

712. The ring is in generally good condition. There is some evidence of re-tipping of the claws in the past. The claws look to be in good condition and the stones appear to be secure. The emeralds are of medium colour saturation and all have a few internal inclusions but there are no unsightly surface reaching inclusions. There is no surface wear to the emeralds. The principal emerald has one small edge nick. The under bezel of the ring is in good condition. The diamonds slightly draw colour to grey and have a few piqué inclusions. The ring would benefit from careful professional cleaning. All the rose cut diamond points are present, some of these have a few internal inclusions. There is no hallmark to the ring. The ring looks to have been sized in the past. Overall an attractive ring. Case - The associated case has some wear to the velvet. The address and silk within the lid is in good condition. The velvet is particular worn at one end at the top. Weight 4.4g.

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
