A Flight, Barr & Barr Worcester vase, circa 1815-20, painted with a titled scene from Sir Walter Scott's poem *The Lady of the Lake*, against a gilt weed ground between beaded borders, raised on gilt paw feet and a trefoil base, black script marks to base, height 9cm (restored), together with a small group of similar Flight Barr Worcester vases, including a pair with cobalt blue ground painted with floral panels, two painted with flowers, a black ground example painted with pink and white roses, raised on four gilt paw feet, height 9cm, and a cylindrical example with gilt bird head and ring handles, height 8.5cm, also a diminutive planter with gilt mask handles and paw feet, height 8.8cm (faults, losses and restoration throughout). Provenance: The Flight Collection.

Condition Report

Floral painted black ground on paw feet and square base - generally ok but missing cover, minuscule nick to side edge of foot.

Lady of the Lake - broken through paw feet and restored back into position with associated professional restoration to trefoil base, otherwise ok.

Pair with cobalt blue ground - one very badly broken through main body and visibly glued/repared, the other with similar damage and repairs to its rim edge and a chip to its base edge - neither missing any elements.

Floral painted example with bird head and ring handles - approx two thirds of neck rim visibly restored.

3 landscape painted with bird head and ring handles - two with extensive yellowed restoration, one with similar semi-professional restoration to the neck rim and handles.

Two floral painted white ground on trefoil bases - one with reduced neck rim, other with professional restoration to main body and neck rim.

Landscape painted campana shaped - missing handles, crazed and extensively restored.

Planter - one gilt mask head handle missing surmount, small crack visible to base interior, otherwise generally ok with light typical wear.
