LOT 1171

A pair of Chinese blue and white export porcelain beakers, Qing dynasty, probably Kangxi period, of flared tapering form, painted with figures and boat in a coastal landscape, heights 10.5cm and 10.9cm (one cracked and repaired), and a Chinese blue and white export porcelain dish, mark of Chenghua but Kangxi period, painted with a dragon, underglaze blue six-character mark to base, diameter 15.7cm (repair and chip to rim), together with a small group of four Chinese carved wood stands.

Estimate: £100 - £200

Condition Report

First beaker - approx one third section of the body broken away in two pieces and visibly glued with small losses to the rim in two places where the break emanates from. Typical fritting/glaze loss to the outer edge of the foot.

Second beaker - in good condition overall, small curve shaped haircrack to glaze on outer edge of foot which has some minor discolouration, and there is an approx 3mm long small chip to the unglazed footrim.

Dish - 7cm long by 2.5cm deep section of rim broken away and visibly glued back into position, with a small triangular section missing from rim alongside, approx 1cm long by 0.8cm deep. Typical very minor fritting to rim.

2 small circular stands both in good condition, one poor quality.

Smaller dish stand in good condition overall.

Larger dish stand with pin repairs to horizontal strut where glue has failed.

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
